Join us on Friday 12th February for a great night of music. Our guest will be Paul Ubana Jones. Paul has performed to internationally acclaim. Concert performances include opening for Bob Dylan, Patti Smith and touring with: Taj Mahal, Keb Mo', Tuck and Patti, Crowded House and Norah Jones. A review of his appearance with Norah Jones stated: *Ubana Jones' big-voiced, open-hearted delivery and full-bodied guitar work*

ranged from blues to folk, at one point sounding like a one-man Led Zeppelin in their Anglofolk mode. He ended with an acapella tune to sustained applause. Festival appearances include Dublin Blues Festival, Byron Bay Blues Festival, Vancouver Folk Festival, Comox Festival, Calgary Festival, Edmonton Festival, Winnipeg and Blues at Bridgetown, as well as festivals across Switzerland, Germany, France and Spain. Paul is well known to audiences throughout New Zealand.

Before Paul performs there will be a blackboard concert followed by supper. What a way to start the year.

Daniel Champagne is coming live to Tsunami (Recording Studios) on March 28, Monday of Easter weekend -Daniel left school, turned professional and hit the road when he was 18 years old. For the next five years he travelled through North America, the United Kingdom, Europe, New Zealand and of course, his homeland Australia sharing stages with the likes of Lucinda Williams, Judy Collins, INXS, John Butler, KT Tunstall and Ani DiFranco.
