Concert Night with Glass Boat



Our guests for 10 February Concert Night are Glass Boat. They are a contemporary folk band from Taranaki. The band members for our concert will be Missie Moffat and Matt Herrett, with Krissy Jackson guesting on violin. Missie (NZ) has a unique voice and jazzy style that gives her an edge of unpredictability, her songs are instant classics. Matt Herrett (UK) provides powerful honest lyrics, tasteful electric sounds and highly praised finger picking guitar playing style. One reviewer wrote that their music is spacious in its arrangement and often takes advantage of their contrasting voices. Each artist takes their turn to lead a track, and harmonies are used to raise choruses. Counter melodies swap between acoustic and electric guitar, added to by cajon-based percussion, giving things a little groove. Others have said that they would not be out of place performing at Womad or opening for Cohen at the Bowl. They played the Auckland Folk Festival in 2016 to a great reception and have played with or supported The Eastern, The Frank Burkitt Band, Albi and the Wolves, Andy Irvine, Eb & Sparrow amongst others. What a way to start the year.

Meet a Member - Marty Smith



Marty was born in Eton (Did you pick his accent?) but was raised in Canning Town in London's East End. He was a regular visitor to the trad jazz clubs in London where he

witnessed the birth of skiffle and the rise of Lonnie Donegan. Marty's father was a heavy weight boxer and brought back blues and jazz records from his trips to the USA. Blues remains a favourite genre for Marty. In the 1950's Marty made 7 trips out to NZ as a sailor in the Merchant Navy. In 1959 he emigrated to NZ and arrived in Paraparaumu in a DC3. He moved to Wellington where he worked and managed a number of the iconic coffee bars of the day. These included the Left Bank, the Grotto and the Beach Comber. These coffee bars provided venues for local folk musicians and Marty still plays many of the songs he first heard back then. He

also got invited to after concert parties when visiting artists like Peter Paul and Mary, the Dubliners and the Clancy Brothers performed in Wellington. In the 1960's he completed a carpentry apprenticeship and was married in 1964. He bought his first guitar with money left over from buying a washing machine and learned bits and pieces from many musicians. In 1987 he moved up the coast and met Birnie while on the door at a Kapiti Live Music Club night. Birnie had been up to the Levin Folk Club and suggested they play together on the blackboard. They first played in May 1999 and fondly remember the support they received from Jeremy, Rona, Andrew and Anne. This was the first of many club backboard appearances. They also used to perform regularly at charity concerts on the Kapiti Coast. Marty says they have a book with about 120 songs they can play. Marty has many music heroes including Woody Guthrie, Lead Belly, Peter Cape, Bob Dylan (sung by others) Eric Clapton and Chris Christofferson. Marty tells me he enjoys performing with Birnie at the Folk Club and we hope they will continue doing so for many years to come. I reckon there are lots of those 120 songs we have yet to enjoy. Thanks Marty (and Birnie) for sharing your music with us and your support of the club. (Ed)
