Concert Night with Gillian Boucher and Bob McNeill



Gillian Boucher is one of Nova Scotia's most well-known fiddlers and seamlessly blends Celtic and contemporary sounds. She has been touring the world since the age of 15, delighting audiences with her innovative and expressive take on traditional music. Her most recent album, Attuned (2014), received great acclaim, snapping up a Nova Scotia Music Award nomination and lots more besides. Originally from Cape Breton Island, Nova Scotia, and from a family steeped in musical tradition, Gillian has toured Scotland, Ireland, Canada, Turkey, USA, New Zealand and Australia.

Bob McNeill moved to New Zealand from Scotland in 1999. He quickly established himself as one of New Zealand's best known folk artists for his solo work and with the celtic duo Ben the Hoose. Bob is a 3-time New Zealand Music Award recipient for Best Folk Album of the Year. His songs have been covered by artists in New Zealand, Scotland, Australia and the USA. His musical and song writing style is a hybrid of the Celtic music of his native Scotland and the American new folk and Americana styles. The Dominion Post compared him to Jackson Brown, James Taylor, Luka Bloom and Dougie MacLean. Wow, you can't miss this one.

Tribute to Marion Birch

Marion often opened the Levin Folk Music Club concert night with a cheery smile, a welcoming and encouraging word to performers and the audience and a thoughtful poem and a song. This is her story.

Marian was born in Birmingham in the West Midlands in 1926. She was the oldest of six children, five girls and a boy. They lived on the outskirts of the city and went cycling in the country for picnics with their father who was a postmaster. This gave Marian an appreciation of the city and countryside. She won a book scholarship to Waverley Grammar School. During WW2 she was billeted in Worcestershire, as German bombers were targeting Birmingham's factories. Her father Gilbert used to cycle out to see his daughters whenever he could. Once the threat of bombing was eased she returned home to work in a factory. Her father didn't approve of her working in a factory so he arranged for Marian to be transferred to the office. She learnt shorthand and typing at night school. From there she worked in telephone exchanges and telegraph offices. Then she heard that there were some short intensive courses in teacher training being offered as teachers were in short supply so she applied and was accepted. She now began the career that lasted most of her life.

While she was teaching in Poole a friend invited her to a dance and she met Brian Birch who was stationed nearby in the navy. In due course they married. It was the end of the war and things were in short supply. Her wedding dress was borrowed from an aunt, it was not a dress that she particularly liked and as the music for the wedding was forgotten the guests had to sing unaccompanied. Marion has 3 children Margaret, Ruth and John. Brian was posted to Malta and the family accompanied him, while there Marian continued her teaching.

After 2 and half years the family returned to England and Brian was eventually transferred to a desk job teaching engineering at the Navel College in Portsmouth, Marian again continued teaching. Brian hated being desk bound and so fifty one years ago the decision was made to emigrate to New Zealand. At first the family lived in Blenheim and Marian taught there. The family then moved to Feilding where Marian taught first at Colyton School, then Lytton Street School and finally Manchester Street where she was the head teacher, in charge of the junior school. She continued to work until she was 65.

When she retired she took up pottery and joined a writers group. She always had an interest in writing even as a young child and wanted to take her writing further. Upon her husband's death her love of literature and poetry led her to attend a Massey University course to polish her writing and poetry skills. These she didn't keep to herself. With the help of a friend Christine Toms she published a book of poems.

Folk clubs – on Sundays she attended the regular jam at the Bent Horseshoe Café at Horseshoe Bend Tokomaru with her daughter and son-in-law Charles Boyce. Steve Tolley, the owner, ran a music afternoon and she was a regular attendee. Marion was also a regular performer at Lily's Ranch House, the Levin Folk Music Club, and the Palmerston North Folk Club where she sang and read her own poetry and songs. Marion will be missed by us all.

Festival Report

A report from Dale on the Australian National Folk Festival in Canberra



Having heard about the National Folk Festival over the years, I flew direct Wgn-Canberra just prior to Easter and found myself camping with some Aussie

friends in a huge sea of campervans, trailers and tents. This festival has been going 51 years and many of the attendees are musicians who have known each other for years through diverse folk clubs and festivals.

It was amazing to see the scope of the festival, with 18 music venues, DIY art spaces, food and market stalls, kids zone, circus lessons and Fringeworld. There were overseas acts, indigenous singers, younger folk/rockers (loopers/celtic/twin sisters), bands incorporating country/blues/world/acoustic, traddies, and my favourites Spooky Mens Chorale and Fred Smith (a diplomat/songwriter/author).

There was a huge emphasis on celtic bands and the Irish Daoriri Farrell Trio and Aoife Scott Band were two to get the crowds up and dancing. A band called 19-Twenty were incredibly lively and loud, and each show was packed out and went late into the night. There were bars in most large marquees and one was under the concrete stands of the Racetrack, coincidentally the warmest venue on the cold Canberra nights. One huge concrete room was filled with 10 or 12 jamming celtic sessions all pumping sound, with fiddles, whistles, bodhrans, etc. Above this was the home of the trad singing sessions which were scheduled mostly during the day.

There was so much to do and rather than walk back 1/2 km to the campground, I found wonderful food on site. Even the fresh cooked damper with golden syrup was a yummy delight! Several blackboards were running all day, and I enjoyed a quiet drink and songs whenever I needed a rest. The 5 days of festival were the biggest and best I've been to, and if the AU \$400 cost seems high, there are volunteer options as well.
