Concert Night Hot Diggity



Our guest artists for August are Hot Diggity. They are the only all-female bluegrass band currently playing in New Zealand. They play original songs by Heather Carrigan (mandolin, guitar and vocals) and Deborah Mackenzie (guitar and vocals) along with plenty of bluegrass favourites. Backed up by Jenine Abarbanel (bass and vocals), Sue Drake (banjo and vocals) and Krissy Jackson (fiddle and vocals), they put out a powerful, lively sound with hot instrumentation and tight harmonies. Hot Diggity was formed in 2014, but all five members are veteran musicians having played with numerous other bands in a variety of musical styles for years. Lovers of bluegrass tradition and the time period of its birth, the Hot Diggity ladies perform while kitted out in the finest 40s and 50s vintage style. Feedback from their debut gig at the Devonport Bunker: 'I have seen a lot of live shows but seriously, it seemed to me that the show tonight was something almost magical.' Hot Diggity have become festival and folk club favourites throughout the country and are in huge demand. We are thrilled to have them perform at our club and look forward to a really special concert. This concert was particularly memorable in that as there was a small audience – about 15 people - we all felt that we really got to know Chris and to learn about her career singing with family, and performing with NZ bands and folk singer Martin Curtis. We all thank Dale sincerely for her hospitality and for taking a lead in encouraging members of our club to support house concerts in future.

Meet a Member

Jeremy Cooper



Jeremy spent his childhood in Wellington. His early recollection of music was hearing the Andrew Sisters singing Rum and Coca-Cola on his parent's record player. He has always enjoyed singing and remembers singing with his brother in the mid 1950's in car trips up to

his grandmother's place in Otaki. The family moved to Otaki, so when Jeremy started secondary school he boarded at Wellington College. He was a keen sportsman (rowing, rugby and fencing blues) and music was confined to music classes which he enjoyed. Further education and family (5 children) took precedence for many years but that started to change when he moved to Levin to practise Law in 1971 as a young dad. Determined to learn the guitar, Jeremy took a few lessons from Tau Matakatea. Music store owner Joe Barnao kept his prized Ibanez in tune for him. He enjoyed singing and playing his guitar at home and at the occasional family and social gathering. Then Jeremy's playing took a big step forward when he began attending church. He began making up songs for the kids at Sunday school and eventually graduated to playing in a church band. He also increased his guitar skills with the help of Robert Williams. (Not that Robbie Williams. Ed). In the early 1990's Jeremy met Rona and accompanied her to Kimberley where they would play for the residents. Jeremy has fond memories of the audience reaction to their playing. Rona also took him to the recently formed folk club and with the encouragement of Eddie and Evie Lambert he immersed

himself in Irish and other folk music. Along with other folk club members he played at the first Manakau Medieval Market. This group of players evolved into a band called Jerry 'n the Atrix. This in turn morphed into the Atrix Band which continued to perform for over 20 years. Jeremy reckons over 20 different musicians performed with the band over those years including Colleen Trenwith and other local performers. Also a number of songs had been composed by Jeremy, some of which he had recorded, first in 2005 by Ian Campbell (of Legal Tender fame), and later in 2011 by David Trail (Tsunami Studios). Both recordings gained radio airplay. Jeremy was a dedicated folk club member and performer and for many years, with his beloved Rona, played as a twosome and often with others at concerts, ceilidhs, markets, the Waitarere Marathon and of course the Medieval Market. He has also been a keen supporter of jam sessions and together with Rona has helped many new musicians to get started. (I am one of them. Ed). In the period 2013 to 2016 Jeremy had a series of operations which left him less able to play his guitar. He has recently got back into singing and it was great to hear him perform again at the last club black board concert. He hopes to do more singing and maybe have a go at the Ukulele in the future. We wish Jeremy all the best and look forward to hearing him once again performing the songs he loves. (You are an inspiration Jeremy. Ed)


