Owen Hugh

Scottish to the core, with a Welsh name, residing in New Zealand, and possessing a permanent hunger for Indian curry, Owen is known for his pure voice, gentle guitar © K Pierce accompaniments and sense of humour. Described in Hattie's Live MusicGuide as having a"silver voice" and delivering "sparse but effective guitar arrangements", Owen performs his own originals as well as a long list of covers, from The Beatles to Robbie Williams. While he'd prefer the label 'new acoustic' over 'folkie', there is no doubting his popularity in the folk scene, as he has played many of the folk clubs in New Zealand and the UK. He has also appeared several times at the Edinburgh Fringe Festival and performed at Cambridge Folk Festival, Stainsby and the Otley Black Sheep Festival.

Owen has made 8 CDs (so far) in collaboration with the many musicians and friends he has met on his travels. However, it's in his live performances that both the power and the humour of his lyrics and delivery really hit home. One reviewer noted he didn't recall one song that was asked for that Owen couldn't sing and play. He commented that Owen is one of the very few performers he had seen that can silence the audience with the power of his songs and delivery alone.

Meet a Member – Dean Murray



Dean was born in Hawera and his family moved onto a dairy farm in Manakau when he was five. He attended

Manakau School and Otaki College. His mother played piano and was a dance teacher. His family was very political and his father was a strong Social Credit supporter back in the day. He started classical piano lessons when he was 8 or 9 years old and remembers his mother strictly enforcing an hour of practice each day. He took lessons for 5 years and achieved Grade 5 theory. He also listened to the radi and would write out all the words of his favourite Deep Purple, Led Zepplin or Beatles song. However, he really wanted to play guitar and would try to play the songs he heard on the radio on the piano, much to the disgust of his teacher. He quit classical piano and tried learning modern piano but found it unsatisfying. He gave that up and through his teenage years he pretty much stopped playing music, although he did start building what would become a great album collection.

In his early twenties he moved to Auckland where a friend taught him 3 chords on a guitar. Dean didn't know any songs so he wrote one. It was an anti Springbok tour song and the start of a successful career as a songwriter. In time he moved back to Palmerston North and worked for 10 years at the Longburn Freezing Works. He lived in the singleman's quarters where he learned lots through informal lessons, but most importantly, he met Bullfrog Rata. They became great friends and would spend lunchtimes working out new songs and experimenting with many different styles. When the Freezing Works closed Dean moved back to Manakau and Bullfrog lived with Dean and his wife Maureen. They practiced often, wrote songs, went busking, got odd gigs and formed a band called the Gravel Slappers. When Bullfrog headed off on his solo career Dean's attention shifted to spending time with his family and music was confined to a bit of writing and playing at home.

In the early 2000's however he got to thinking he would like to get back into playing. He started writing politically orientated songs and went busking in Levin and Palmy. He worked as a builder where he met Ian Campbell who was a plumber at that time. Ian had a studio and invited Dean up to play some songs. Ian's comment, "have you got anything you have actually finished" made Dean realise he needed to rework and polish his material. Eventually he recorded an album titled 'Yeah Nah" with the backing of Ian and lots of other wellknown musicians. One of the songs off the album made it into the top 10 of an international songwriting contest.

He got involved with the Organic River Festival and played a few times. Fortuitously, he also met Carylann Martin who was doing sound for the festival. He later asked her for help scripting his songs as she was a trained music teacher and she in turn introduced him to Anje Glindemann who played drums. Sometime later Kirsten London who played bass guitar joined them and Henpicked was born.

Henpicked practiced every Monday from 10.00am to 3.00pm and performed for over seven years. They toured in Taranaki, through the top of the South Island, did house concerts, hundreds of gigs, recorded 3 albums and were favourites at the Levin Folk Club and many other venues. Their theatrical flair was legendary as were their collective and individual talents.

Since leaving Henpicked Dean has been busy making himself some beautiful guitars and continues to write and perform. He is pleased to be back performing at the Folk Club and has ambitions to record another album using the instruments he has made. We are all enjoying hearing Dean's music again at the club and wish him well in wherever his remarkable talent leads him. (Thanks Dean, Ed)

Members Out and About



Anne and Andrew's experience of the 10th Anniversary of Nanga Music Festival, Western Australia in October.

We had discovered this festival was happening soon after booking our flights to Perth for a 2 week holiday and we immediately joined the Nanga Music Festival mailing list to ensure we could buy a couple of the limited number of tickets that would later become available for this small intimate festival (about 300 attendees).

We planned our travel around attending this festival and as luck would have it, a restored railway Andrew wanted to visit was at the town of Dwellingup too. Being the 10th anniversary, there was a line-up of special festival guests.

The festival takes place in a rustic bush camp situated a few kilometres inland from the small town of Dwellingup (about 1.5 hours south of Perth) and is situated in the midst of an extensive and beautiful eucalyptus forest with an understory of ferns, grass trees and native flowers. The area is also the home of small brown kangaroos that live in the forest and are quite used to people. (One came right into one of the lodges, others were happy to pose with the visitors.) The weather was not warm - with cold nights just like Wellyfest!

Thr separate large accommodation and community room lodges (Currawong, Timbarra, and Woodshed) are connected by bush walks and a shuttle van was also available periodically. Mezzanine floors with small bunk rooms surround the lower level central community areas of all 3 lodges used. The main community lodge (Currawong) hosts all the performance concerts. The rustic lodge designs incorporate huge gum tree poles. Great communal dining in Woodshed - big catered meals on two nights, and a gourmet BBQ meal was arranged by the committee on the last night. Our first time there, we didn't know many of the performers apart from Enda Kenny, Fred Smith and Liz Fransham. But the quality and diversity of the performers was amazing. There was an emphasis on original songwriters and genres included blues, jazz, folk, a little poetry, and rock.

There was no Americana, nor Bluegrass and never a banjo to be heard - but we loved it all. Some highlight performers were Fred Smith and Enda Kenny who are always a treat to hear, Bush Gothic was an awesome band, with Jenni Thomas's hauntingly beautiful reconfiguring of old traditional tunes to fit their musical genre e.g. Botany Bay and Down in the Willow Gardens - in Gothic style. (I hope some of you heard Bush Gothic when they gave one of just 3 NZ shows in Wellington at Labour Weekend.) Kristina Olsen is a down- to - earth performer with great stories and songs to share. Gina Williams and Guy Ghouse sang original songs in their native aboriginal dialect, and Rose Parker Trio with country songs. A new genre for us was gothic rock - the youth band Kallidad were exceptionally talented young men who perform in full white, red and black gothic face paint (reminiscent of KISS band make-up). They were favourites of young and old festival goers. The band plays instrumentals only, interspersed with loud shouts occasionally. They have a lively and loud flamenco rock sound and have a very good audience rapport. We heartily recommend this intimate and exceptional Australian music festival. Motel accommodation is available at nearby Dwellingup for international visitors without camping gear for the bunkrooms. Anne and Andrew (Thanks for sending this to us Anne, Ed)
